

Definition

In concatenative morphology, a morpheme is the smallest semantically meaningful unit of a language.

e.g. un- = negation -ness = nominal form happy = ©


Assumption: words can be decomposed (=concatenative).

Free Morpheme

Some morphemes are standalone words.

E.g. happy, joy, purple, possible, ...

Free morphemes can function as standalone words.

Bound Morpheme

Morphemes that are not words in themselves, and must be attached to another morpheme are called bound morphemes

E.g. un-, re-, -ness, -ment, ...

Non-Concatenative Cases

Breaking a word up into morphemes is not always easy/feasible.

e.g.

feet = foot + plural ?
sang = sing + past tense?
